ABOUT THE CONFERENCE

Demographic trends show a rapidly growing number of older citizens in the population. In the near future every third patient will be aged 65 and more. This involves the need to pay attention to the aspect of quality of care for the older persons, especially in the last phase of life. This applies in particular to people living in long term care institutions (LTCFs), namely in Poland, nursing homes (DPS), care and treatment facilities (ZOL) and nursing and care facilities (ZPO).

End-of-life care is always a major challenge for the staff and managers of these institutions and the families of residents. It requires a special training in terms of knowledge, skills, communication and organization, especially in situations where palliative care is not always available in institutions.

The conference aims to draw attention to the possibility of improving the quality of care for people dying in LTCFs. Through presentations and workshops we want to provide healthcare and social workers and managers of these institutions with the latest guidelines of care principles and tools for implementation and realization of a high-quality end-of-life care.
